Your Access and Privacy Rights

May 17, 2001

One of the key mandates of the Ontario Information and Privacy Commission is to help Ontarians understand their rights under the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act and the Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act.

As well as publishing a wide array of brochures, policy papers and other publications; maintaining an informative Web site; and offering special teachers' kits to Grade 5 social studies teachers and Grade 10 civics teachers across the province, the IPC has a variety of speakers' programs.

Under, its *Reaching out to Ontario* program, the IPC sends a team of speakers to several different regions of Ontario each year. The 2001 *Niagara Region Educational Initiative* is the sixth such initiative since the program was launched in the fall of 1999.

A public information session, being held at St. Catharines' central library (54 Church Street) the evening of May 17, is a key part of this initiative. At this 7 p.m. meeting, a team from the IPC will briefly outline Ontario's provincial and municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy legislation, explain the IPC's role as an oversight agency, and outline what your access and privacy rights are.

A public meeting, at which a team from the IPC will outline individuals' rights under Ontario's Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy legislation, is being held at the central branch of the St. Catharines Public Library, 54 Church Street.
