### Three main takeaways:


- 1. De-identification is considered a "use" under PHIPA
- 2. Custodians planning to de-identify and sell data to a third party must clearly and explicitly state this in their public notice
- 3. Sale agreements must include additional privacy and security controls to ensure data remains de-identified



## PHIPA Decision 175 & ETHI Recommendations

 Decision 175 parallels recommendations of the House of Commons Standing Committee on Access to Information, Privacy and Ethics (ETHI).

- These recommendations focus on:
  - transparency
  - prohibiting re-identification
  - process and standards for de-identifying data





Ontario's health privacy law, the Personal Health Information Protection Act (PHIPA), applies to virtual care as it does to in-person care. Custodians must comply with the provisions of PHIPA, in addition to all other applicable laws and regulations, as well as guidance issued by relevant professional regulators.

In this guide, we recall some of the key requirements in PHIPA relevant to all custodians, including those who operate in a virtual health care context. We then provide some practical steps custodians should take to protect personal health information, particularly as they plan and deliver

#### Public interest disclosure

Intario's freedom of information laws give the public the right to access government-held information so they car articipate meaningfully in the democratic process and old elected officials and public servants accountable.

The public interest in disclosure is a key factor that Ontario's public sector organizations must consider when deciding whether to release records in response to certain access requests under the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act and its municipal

Ontario's access laws contain a "public interest override" provision, which is found in s.23 of FIPPA and s.16 of MFIPPA. It requires a public sector organization to "override" the application of certain exemptions and disclose a record in situations where there is a compelling public interest in doing so that clearly outweighs the purpose of the exemption. This provision allows for a balance between certain exemptions from freedom of information requests and the public's right to know.

The acts may also require government to disclose certain records in the public interest even when no one is asking for them. The requirement to disclose records even in the absence of an access request is found in s.11 of FIPPA and s.5 of MFIPPA. It applies where a record reveals a grave environmental, health or safety hazard and it is in the public interest to release it, despite any other provisions in FIPPA and MFIPPA.

The purpose of this fact sheet is to help public sector organizations and the public understand:


